Also known as Hiroshima camps. PoWs worked in a coal mine. 200 British PoWs were transported from Java in the " <i>Singapore Maru</i> ". On the way stops were made at Singapore and Taiwan; destination was Moji, Japan, arriving at the camp 28th November 1942. The conditions on the <i>Singapore Maru</i> accounted for 60 men dying on board and many of those who reached Moji were transported to Moji Hospital where they died within the next month.
